Dear Mr. Getting,

I have reviewed the application submitted to the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) on November 27, 2002 for review and prioritization for the Criminal Justice Division, Office of the Governor (CJD) under the Violence Against Women Act funds for FY 2004.

Your application is Ineligible for further review and scoring by the Criminal Justice Policy Development Committee for the following reasons:

- The title of your project is "Violence Against Men"
- The Purpose and Program Requirements for Violence Against Women Act you submitted
  along with your application indicates in the Primary Mission and Purpose (28 C.F.R., Part
  90) that "the STOP Violence Against Women Act program provides funds to projects with
  the primary mission of developing and implementing effective, victim-centered law
  enforcement, prosecution and court strategies to <u>address violent crimes against women</u>
  and the development and enhancement of victim services in <u>cases involving violent</u>
  <u>crimes against women.</u>" (emphasis added)
- Ineligible Activities number one is "Programs that focus on children and/or men;"
- Your Problem statement begins with "Men have not seen themselves, much less the community, as targets of domestic violence yet fit the profile without knowing where to go for services. Emotional support and legal services are needed to meet these special needs."
- The Goal Statement indicates "To provide outreach to men and children of domestic violence in Dallas County..."
- The Target Group lists as the Gender: "Adult Men"
- Activity 4.7 lists a "Violence Against Men brochure"
- Your Project Objectives begin with "Victims Served: Men and Children served"
- The Project Summary paragraph three states "...The target group of 100 men and children that are targets of domestic violence is less than the projected needs based on various studies showing the amount of violence toward men."

I have included copies of the above pages you submitted with the appropriate language highlighted. Although this may be a very worthy project and a need in Dallas County it is not eligible for funding under the Violence Against Women Act.

# PURPOSE AND PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN ACT

Primary Mission and Purpose (28 C.F.R., Part 90)

The STOP Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) program provides funds to projects with the primary mission of developing and implementing effective, victim-centered law enforcement, prosecution and court strategies to address violent crimes against women and the development and enhancement of victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women.

Federal Distribution Requirements (28 C.F.R., Part 90 and Division B. VAWA 2000, Section 1102)
According to federal rules, CJD must distribute at least 25% of grant funds for law enforcement programs, 25% for prosecution programs, 30% for victim services programs, and 5% for court programs.

Minimum Award - \$5,000 Maximum Award - \$80,000

Maximum Award for Violence Against Women Courts - \$250,000

# VAWA PROJECT NARRATIVE & SUMMARY

#### PART 1: PROBLEM STATEMENT AND DATA

#### Need Help?

Men have not seen themselves, much less the community, as targets of domestic violence yet fit the profile without knowing where to go for services. Emotional support and legal services are needed to meet these special needs.

Information on violence against men is indirect as related to violence against women. The City of Dallas Police Department has collected information on family violence calls and arrests.

According to the Texas Department of Human Services, between 1998 and 2000, 59.22% of victims sought outreach services instead of emergency shelters. Dallas County has one of the highest rates of domestic violence. Statistics from the City of Dallas for the year 2001 show there were 20,448 calls related to domestic violence. For the first six months of 2002 there were 11,272 calls. Women accounted for 968 arrests in the year 2001 and 478 in the first six months in 2002. The men had no place to go for services geared to help men and their children.

Many of these victims need free or low cost civil legal assistance in addition to advocates to inform them of options to their rights, safety, and a trusted link to the courts to ensure they are heard. The Dallas County Domestic Violence Focus Group identified Support Groups (page 2), Legal Services (page 3), and Victim Advocates (page 5) as needed service areas.

The existing domestic violence services are geared toward helping women and not men and their children.

#### PART 6: PROJECT SUMMARY:

#### Need Help?

There has been a disappointing response from the present domestic violence organizations when it comes to the treatment of men and their children. This program is intended to identify this previously under-served segment of domestic violence. Domestic violence knows neither fairness nor political correctness only those that are targets of this violence. The general public recognizes there is a problem with no current program addressing this group.

Domestic violence that is perpetuated against victims is grounded in an abuse of power by the offenders, reinforced through intimidation and coercion, sanctioned by traditional societal and cultural norms and supported by the legal system's historically discriminatory response to domestic violence.

Fathers for Equal Rights (FER) seeks this grant to reach out to a segment of society that is not receiving any services nor assistance. The target group of 100 men and children that are targets of domestic violence is less than the projected needs based on various studies showing the amount of violence toward men. As with any start up program, the initial per capita cost is relatively high at \$600 per person.

The program will target various civic and community organizations with information and identifiers of domestic violence. A partnership will be developed to better provide service for advocacy and victim rights. As this program develops the target group will expand to meet the need.

This application provides for training counselors and victim advocates. The counselors and advocates will provide direct aide to the victims and to facilitate liaison and community partnerships with other victim service providers aimed at the victims to become self sufficient in a safe environment.

This funding will provide men and children that are targets of domestic violence with information, referrals, counselors, follow up contact, and personal advocates as well as other identified needs that present themselves.

FER serves as a link to the community services that presently exist in uncoordinated service for men and children. This link provides initial and ongoing support, advocacy, accompaniment services, and encourage local awareness of and among the victim services organizations thus reducing duplication of existing services..
